This Little Light of Mine

One of my fondest summer memories as a child is of catching "lightning bugs" (or fireflies) in a mason jar. As I grew older I took these lovely creatures of summer for granted until the summer of 2001, when I was living in a large city in the south. Because of the light pollution, I could not see what had once been a favorite ritual of my summer. You see for me, the first sighting each year held the promise of no school, going barefoot, and reading until the wee hours of dawn.

Over the next five years, I forgot about fireflies until one night in early June. I was sitting on my deck the first night in my new house in Tennessee, when twilight faded and I saw the twinkling. I was a child again! I quickly found a jar and began the "capture."

Now at the beginning of each summer, I anxiously wait for the first sighting. Childhood memories rush back and anticipation of long summer days await.

As school librarians, we can learn a few lessons from fireflies:

1) Make your presence known! Like the firefly's twinkling light, constantly promote your program. Shout, "I'm here. Look at what I can do!" Let your faculty know that you are eager to work collaboratively with them. Let your parents know about the library program through your website, newsletters and the media. Most importantly, share your love of books with your students. Be diligent.

2) Be unique! Fireflies are the only insects that light our summer nights. Most likely you are the only librarian in your building or possibly one of two librarians. What does that say about you? How is your role unique? You are the information expert and you should take advantage of every opportunity to stay current with trends in our field, to demonstrate your expertise and to promote information literacy.

3) Glow! Have you ever been stung by a firefly? Had your lawn sprayed to get rid of fireflies? Fireflies are not considered to be negative. Are you? Strive to be positive, smile, laugh and enjoy your day. Be known in your building for not only having the most sought after

titles but also the best coffee or chocolate. Make those around you feel good about themselves. Be a social butterfly.

4) Avoid capture or the feeling of being trapped! It seems each year more responsibilities are added to our job descriptions, new evaluations loom over our heads, and there is never enough time. Fight the feeling of defeat by networking with colleagues, decide what tasks are most important, and what can be let go. When you feel trapped, come up to the top of the jar where someone who cares has punched some holes in the aluminum foil and breathe. Make time for a hobby and spend time with friends and family. You know what they say, "All work and no play ..."

As adults, we sometimes take for granted the small things that once made us smile. We often take ourselves too seriously and forget about the child within us all. I hope that you have had a restful summer, full of laughter and good memories. As you begin this school year, look for the opportunity head to cherish the small things each day.

TASL and AASL – A Joint Adventure

On June 11, 2011, TASL hosted “Empowering 21st Century Learners: P21 Framework and AASL Learning Standards.” Jackie Chetzron, institute presenter, and twenty-three librarians from across the state met at Trevecca University for a day of learning what the P21 Framework was, how it related to the AASL standards, and how we can actively advocate for the infusion of 21st century skills into education.



During the institute key questions were explored including:

- What is the difference between P21 Framework and the AASL Learning Standards?
- How are the *Standards for the 21st-Century Learner* aligned with the P21 Framework?
- What skills will students need in the future?
- How will the *Standards for the 21st-Century Learner* empower students to address the world they will face?



Participants took the AASL standards one at a time and placed them on a chart with the P21 standards. They then

brainstormed ways that we can actively advocate the infusion of 21st century skills into education. Some of the suggestions were:

- Professional Development session demonstrating projects that other teachers have done. Teachers talk about how librarians and teachers collaborated.
- Collaborate with the teachers showing them what they can do when you work together
- Evangelistic outreaching to teachers
- Getting the teachers to get on board and use the technology that we are trying to use with the students. Have the teachers see you using google.docs, or another program, and then show them how to use it.
- Let students teach each other. Takes the pressure off the teacher.
- How are we going to reach out and use more sources?
- Get on the Leadership Team at your building level. Let them know what you are doing, and hear what they are doing.



It was a day full of discussion and sharing of ideas. Everyone went home energized and ready to see how we can bring our students into 21st century learning.

The good news is that Margaret Peterson Haddix had already been booked by TASL as the keynote presenter for this year's conference. In addition to having 2010 winners John Himmelman, Brandon Mull, and Susan Beth Pfeffer at the awards banquet, we will also have Margaret Peterson Haddix at the ceremony.

As we begin working under the new guidelines for the VSBA, you will start to see some changes. First, all committees have now been expanded to include twenty members. This expansion will allow more TLA and TASL members to participate. While this year's list of nominees reflects the old guidelines, the nomination lists for 2012-2013 feature the new configuration. The 2012-2013 lists have four divisions: Pre-K through 2nd, 3rd through 5th, 6th through 8th, and finally 9th through 12th. Also, starting this spring, children and teens will be able to vote for their favorite VSBA title at their public library, provided that they did not participate at their school. We hope to increase participation and interest in the VSBA by involving Tennessee's public libraries.





An Idea that Works!

I start every class with a daily keynote. While I'm checking in books, my students are watching the daily keynote. It's always backed with music, ranging from classical to the Beatles to Frank Sinatra, depending on the day or what's going on. Each day's keynote has a "Welcome: Today is....," slide, a "Your next visit to the library slide," an "In the library, your class will be learning X, doing X, etc., focusing on the SPI, etc.; a "Today in History" slide which shows just that (not always serious history, mind you, but sometimes cultural history, such as "Today in history, I Love Lucy debuted on television in _____," and "Happy birthday" slide to some person-known, offbeat-I usually don't do students here, and finally "Dates 4-U" which lists upcoming dates that my students should be aware of. They're relatively quick to create and duplicate, changing them daily, saving them. The kids seem to enjoy them because they never know what's going to be there.


